

**Royal Commission** into Victoria's Mental Health System



## **PUBLIC HEARINGS SCHEDULE - JULY 2019**

RELEASED 14 JUNE 2019

Between 2 and 26 July 2019 the Royal Commission will conduct its first public hearings. The public hearings are an important part of the activities the Royal Commission and will allow us to gather evidence about Victoria's Mental Health System. They will inform our deliberations leading up to the production of our interim report in November 2019.

At the public hearings, the Royal Commission will hear from witnesses about issues and questions relevant to the Royal Commission's Terms of Reference. Witnesses will include consumers and carers, service providers and their workforce, experts and government representatives.

The Royal Commission values and respects the contribution that people living with mental illness provide and as such a significant proportion of the hearings will be dedicated to listening to them and hearing about their experiences.

The public hearings will be conducted around a series of topics, with key issues and questions relevant to the mental health system explored.

The schedule below sets out the topics to be explored each day. The schedule may be subject to variation, and the Royal Commission may depart from it before or during the hearings if it considers it appropriate to do so.

## LOCATIONS

The hearings will be held on weekdays in Melbourne (2 - 12 July and 17 - 26 July), Maryborough (15 July) and Thornbury (16 July). The schedule below includes the location and address for each day of the public hearings.
